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Foreword by the Chair of the NJCA Council

During the period covered by this report, the College started a number of outreach activities to improve its communication with the judiciary about the College. These included publication of a regular electronic newsletter and continuing efforts to develop judicial education programs online.

Significant improvements have been made to the College website: to provide better information about forthcoming programs and to provide online registration and online access to program materials and information.

Cutbacks in funding to courts around Australia continue to impact adversely on their ability to support the participation of judges and magistrates in educational activities. Additionally in some States appointments are not being made, or are being delayed, when judicial officers retire. The resulting decline in numbers of judicial officers registering for programs has led the College to cancel some programs or to conduct some programs less frequently.

During the year, the Commonwealth Government made a further grant to the College to fund judicial education programs on indigenous justice. These programs are organised by State and Territory indigenous justice committees to further the understanding of judicial officers of indigenous communities and their problems.

The Commonwealth Government also made a grant to meet the costs of the maintaining the Commonwealth Sentencing Database. This grant will serve the interests of justice by assisting judicial officers in delivering appropriate and consistent sentencing for Commonwealth offences.

In November 2013, I and other representatives of the College attended the sixth conference of the International Organisation on the Training of the Judiciary in Washington DC. The College led a session on leadership training for the judiciary. The conference was preceded by a meeting, convened by the College, of judicial education organisations in the Asia/Pacific region. Through these initiatives, the College made a useful contribution to support and improve judicial education in other countries.

I am grateful to the staff of the College, who continue to achieve much with the resources available.

I am also grateful to the substantial number of judges and magistrates who voluntarily devote time, energy and expertise to assist the College in developing and delivering judicial education programs.

College Professional Development Programs 2013/2014

The College continues to present judicial professional development programs around Australia and to develop new programs.

College programs use structured discussion of practical problems in small groups. The focus is on interactive learning rather than lectures. This means that most programs cater for groups of no more than 30 participants. This approach involves presenters and staff in more work than would be involved in lectures. However, the Council remains convinced that presenting a small number of high quality programs of long term educational value is the best use of resources.

The College also caters to larger groups in the traditional conference style. The Sentencing-From Theory to Practice Conference, conducted in Canberra in February 2014, is an example. It attracted a multi-disciplinary audience of judicial officers, academics, government officers and others interested in the latest research and developments in a field directly relevant to courts.

Judges and magistrates from all courts in Australia are eligible to attend College programs. Tribunal members are eligible to attend some programs. Some programs are limited to categories of participants: for example, orientation programs are restricted to recent appointees.

The College's Programs Advisory Committee and planning committees review and revise programs in the light of feedback from participants. Responses indicate a high level of satisfaction. The College develops new programs on the basis of proposals made by judicial officers when evaluating programs they attend, by program planning committees, and by government agencies.

The College continues the development of new online programs. These programs provide an interactive social learning environment that can be accessed anywhere and at any time. Participants can access programs via iPads, mobile phones or computers. While not every judicial education topic is appropriate for online presentation, online learning offers a very cost-

effective way of presenting judicial education.

Phoenix Magistrates Program

The Phoenix Magistrates Program was presented in August 2013 at Broadbeach in Queensland. This was the eleventh year the program has been run. The 19 participants came from Magistrates' Courts across Australia, as well as the Magistrates' Court of the Solomon Islands, the Subordinate Courts of Singapore and the Family Court of Western Australia. A substantial part of the program is based on group discussion led by members of the group and outside experts. The program covers a diverse range of topics including judicial conduct and ethics, decision making and giving judgment, children as witnesses, court craft, sentencing, cultural awareness, physical and mental health.

Dialogues on Being a Judge

The Dialogues on Being a Judge Program was presented at Crafers in South Australia in August 2013. The program was designed for experienced judges and focused on four themes: judicial ethics; media/social media and its influence on the judiciary; neurobiological research (how neurobiology can provide insight into human behaviour); and demographics and social trends in Australia in the next 5 to 10 years.

The program was attended by 13 judges from federal and State courts, the Supreme and National Courts of Papua New Guinea, the High Court of the Solomon Islands and the Subordinate Courts of Singapore.

Online Coroners Program

In 2013 the College shifted to an online social learning format the Coroners Program which had been delivered in a face to face format in Brisbane in 2012. The sections of the online program covered the coroner's role, the purposes of a coronial investigation, making autopsy decisions, whether to hold an inquest and managing an inquest. At the end of the program coroners are more strongly equipped to identify reportable deaths, make targeted autopsy decisions, more confidently decide whether or not to hold an inquest, and to manage inquests more effectively. 12 magistrates participated in the online program. The program will be repeated in 2014.

National Judicial Orientation Programs

Two National Judicial Orientation programs were held during the year. The first was in September 2013 in Hobart Tasmania and the second in June 2014 at Broadbeach Queensland. The Program is a joint offering by the College, the Judicial Commission of New South Wales and the Australasian Institute of Judicial Administration. The Program assists newly appointed judicial officers with the transition to judicial office, with a particular focus on skills required of a trial judge. It covers topics such as judicial conduct and ethics, assessing the credibility of witnesses, psychological and physical health, judgment writing, court craft, interpreters, litigants in person, sentencing and time management.

The September 2013 program was attended by twenty two judges. The June 2014 program was attended by twenty three judges. Participants came from State courts, federal courts, and the High Court of the Solomon Islands.

Facilitation Skills Programs

In October 2013 the College conducted a Facilitation Skills Program for judicial officers in Sydney. As part of efforts to improving the knowledge and skills of judicial officers involved in presenting the College's judicial education programs, the Program aimed to give them a knowledge of adult learning principles and learning styles, effective facilitation skills to engage participants in programs (e.g. small group work, pair work, role plays, debriefing and questioning techniques, managing group dynamics) and training in the use of training resources and aids. Participants came from federal and State Courts in WA, SA, QLD and Victoria. There were 4 magistrates, 4 judges from District and other courts and 6 judges from superior courts.

In February 2014 the College presented a two day facilitation skills program for judicial officers in Perth. Additionally a one day Facilitation Skills program was delivered to 12 Perth registrars.

Judicial Decision Making for Magistrates

In November 2013 the College presented a one day program for magistrates in Western Australia on judicial decision making. The program explored the principles and psychology of decision-making in high-volume jurisdictions,

techniques for improved decision-making (especially in relation to fact-finding) and giving reasons for decision.

Judicial Health and Wellbeing

In November 2013 the College assisted in organising a session in the South Australian Courts' Judicial Development Day on health and wellbeing. The session was presented by Dr Nigel Prior (psychiatrist Brisbane) and covered dealing with stress and obtaining appropriate work/life balance.

Sentencing From Theory to Practice Conference

The College joined the Australian National University College of Law in organising a conference on Sentencing From Theory to Practice in February 2014. The Conference attracted 142 participants, including judicial officers, academics, court administrators, and people from government agencies. The program was presented by six experienced judicial officers, six academics, and experts in psychology, psychiatry, corrections, prosecution, defence, and journalism. The topics included the historical bases for theories of sentencing, punishment and deterrence; sentencing of indigenous offenders, sentencing and the media; sentencing of those with mental health and/or cognitive impairments. The Keynote Speaker for the Conference was Emeritus Vinerian Professor of English Law at All Souls College Oxford, Andrew Ashworth.

Judgment Writing Program

In March 2014 the College presented a three day judgment writing program in Brisbane. The program was designed to enhance participants' judgment writing skills through analysis, discussion and rewriting of judgments in small groups. The workshop groups will be assisted by professional writers and senior judges. The program was attended by thirty two participants. They came from Supreme, District and Magistrate courts, federal courts, tribunals, the subordinate courts of Singapore and the High Court of the Maldives.

Support for court judicial education

During the year the College continued to assist courts with their own professional development events. This included advising judicial education committees on topics and presenters and delivering facilitation skills training.

Plans for professional development programs 2014/2015

The College is well advanced in planning for programs in 2014/2015.

In 2014 the College will again present an online program for coroners. Based on the online program delivered in early 2013 to Coroners around Australia, this program will be tailored to the needs of Coroners in New South Wales.

Witness Assessment Programs will be held in Brisbane in September 2014 and in Canberra in December 2014. The programs aim to enhance skills in assessing of witness reliability, delivering clear reasons for accepting or rejecting testimony, and delivering clear jury directions about evaluating a witness.

In October 2014, the College will present a two day leadership program for heads of jurisdiction (Chief Justices, Chief Judges, Chief Magistrates) from Australia, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea. Building on similar programs conducted in 2007 and 2011, the program will explore the leadership qualities that a head of jurisdiction needs to develop and their practical application.

A two day workshop will be presented in Melbourne in November 2014 on Understanding and Managing People in Court. The program will provide judicial officers with an understanding of how to assess where an offender or litigant is in the behavioural change cycle (or the prospects for any such change).

A two day Jury Management program will be held in Melbourne in November 2014. This program has been designed for judges less than five years from appointment, and will explore effective communication with juries at all stages of a trial, dealing with issues that arise during a trial, delivering a charge and dealing with longer jury trials.

The College is working with the ANU College of Law to organise a national conference in Canberra in February 2015 on legal issues relating to children.

A Judgment Writing Program will be held in Adelaide in March 2015. The National Judicial Orientation Program will be presented in mid 2015.

Planning committees are also developing new programs on giving oral decisions, appeal court judgment writing and children in court. An online program on decision making is being developed jointly with the Council of Australasian Tribunals.

Indigenous cultural awareness programs

During 2013/2014, through its National Committee on Indigenous Justice, the College worked with State indigenous justice committees to develop programs to assist judges and magistrates to understand indigenous cultural practices and to apply the law appropriately in indigenous communities.

Social and cultural awareness

The College's residential programs continue to include sessions raising social and cultural awareness issues for the judiciary. Examples include sessions on cultural difficulties that many litigants confront in accessing the justice system and sessions on identifying possible biases in decision making.

Online Clearinghouse on Judicial Education

The College works with courts and judicial education bodies in Australia and New Zealand to maintain an electronic clearinghouse of judicial education resources. The clearinghouse is a means of preserving the judicial education curriculum and making it readily accessible.

Commonwealth Sentencing Database

The Commonwealth Sentencing Database is a joint project between the College, the Judicial Commission of New South Wales and the Office of the Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions. It is funded by grants from the Commonwealth Government.

The Database provides users with online access to statistical information in the form of graphs and tables on the range and frequency of penalties. The ANU College of Law has developed a component of the Database which provides concise commentary on sentencing principles for Commonwealth criminal offences. The Database is accessible through the College website at www.njca.com.au

Appeals Court Judgment Writing Protocol

The College facilitated meetings of judges which prepared a protocol on writing appeal court judgments. The aim of the protocol is to act as a guide for appellate judges in the efficient despatch of appellate business. It covers issues such as preparation for the appeal, the length of judgments, citation of authorities, the framework of a judgment and whether to deal with all grounds of appeal. The protocol has been endorsed in principle by most intermediate courts of appeal in Australia. A copy of the protocol is available on the College website.

College Outreach activities

NJCA website

The College website www.njca.com.au provides information about the College, its programs, its publications and contact details. It also provides a calendar, based on information provided by courts and other bodies, giving information about judicial professional development events around Australia.

The NJCA website was significantly improved during the year. It was expanded to include comprehensive information about the College and its programs. It now allows online registration and payment of registration fees. Participants in programs can access program materials online. Members of the NJCA Council and planning Committees can access meeting materials online.

NJCA eNewsletter

During the year the College began to distribute an electronic newsletter to members of the judiciary during the year. The newsletter will appear quarterly and contains information about future programs as well as links to articles of interest on judicial education topics.

The College and the Australian National University

The College is hosted by the Australian National University College of Law. In February 2014, the College joined the ANU College of Law in organising a national conference on Sentencing From Theory to Practice. Both organisations will build on this success through a conference on Children and the Courts in Canberra in February 2015.

College Funding

Operating costs are met by annual contributions totalling \$573,372 in 2013/2014 from the Commonwealth Government and the Governments of New South Wales, Queensland, Western Australia, South Australia, Tasmania, the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory.

Because government funding does not cover the cost of delivering programs, the College charges registration fees. The fee varies according to program length, venue and the number of presenters.

Accounts are prepared by its accountants, Beames and Associates, and are audited by RSM Bird Cameron Partners. The College provides an annual financial report to the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission.

COLLEGE ADMINISTRATION

NJCA Council

The governing Council is comprised of four judicial members, a member nominated by the Commonwealth Attorney-General, and a member nominated by participating State and Territory Attorneys-General. Members of the Council and their alternates are listed in Attachment A.

Regional Convenors

Regional Convenors (listed in Attachment A) contribute mainly by participation in program planning committees for events taking place in their States, advertising programs to the judiciary and advising on College plans, policies and projects.

Programs Advisory Committee

The Programs Advisory Committee oversees the work of planning committees in developing and presenting programs; sets priorities for the development of new programs; and advises the Council and committees on educational methods.

Members of the Committee are listed in Attachment B.

Program Planning Committees

Small committees of judicial officers and administrators plan and oversee the delivery of programs. The members of each committee are listed in attachment C.

Judicial Associates

The College currently has three Honorary Judicial Associates: Judge Richard Cogswell (District Court NSW), the Hon Peter Gray (Federal Court of Australia rtd) and Judge Paul Lakatos (District Court NSW). Their role is to assist the College in the development and presentation of programs. In their capacity as Visiting Fellows to the ANU College of Law they present lectures to students and judge mooting events.
